# **TIPS FOR ADVISERS**

First off, THANK YOU for helping your Young Reporters! We really appreciate your efforts and hope this proven journalism program is as rewarding for you as it is for your students. Here are some pointers to get you started.

## **Story Deadlines**

It's always a good idea to submit stories before the end of the month prior to the publication date. If a Young Reporter is running a few days behind on a time-sensitive or big story, call us to make special arrangements. Stories can be e-mailed to youngreporter@beesf.org, mailed or faxed. Photos are appreciated and should be e-mailed or mailed.

## **Story Ideas**

Young Reporters often have a hard time coming up with a solid story idea. Encourage your students to follow the news—local papers and TV stations often run timely and appropriate stories that just need a kid's spin. Don't let your reporters copy newspaper or TV reports, though. They need to get out there and cover their story, gathering information and conducting interviews.

Community events, volunteer work, special school happenings or outstanding people are great potential stories. If a reporter is really stuck, call us for suggestions.

## **Regular Meetings**

Regular meetings help to keep students on track and motivated. Try to make stories due at one of your meetings each month.

At the meetings, you can brainstorm story ideas, assign stories or review the Young Reporters Stylebook (especially the sections

on writing, interviewing and gathering facts so stories contain the 5 W's and H). You can also use stories in *Bear Essential News* as examples of good writing. What's the lead in a story? What are the 5 W's and H in the story? Meetings also can be used to practice interviewing skills and to give students feedback on their stories!

#### **Photos**

It's true—a picture can paint a thousand words. So if possible, send photos to accompany a story.

Parents or advisers who accompany a Young Reporter doing an interview or covering a special event can act as official photographer. Many times, photos for an event or of a famous person are already available for the media—just ask!

Digital images can be e-mailed to youngreporter@beesf.org and should be sent as JPEG or TIFF images between 100K and 1Mb in size. We cannot use photos embedded in the text of a story. Regular color prints can be sent in the mail.
